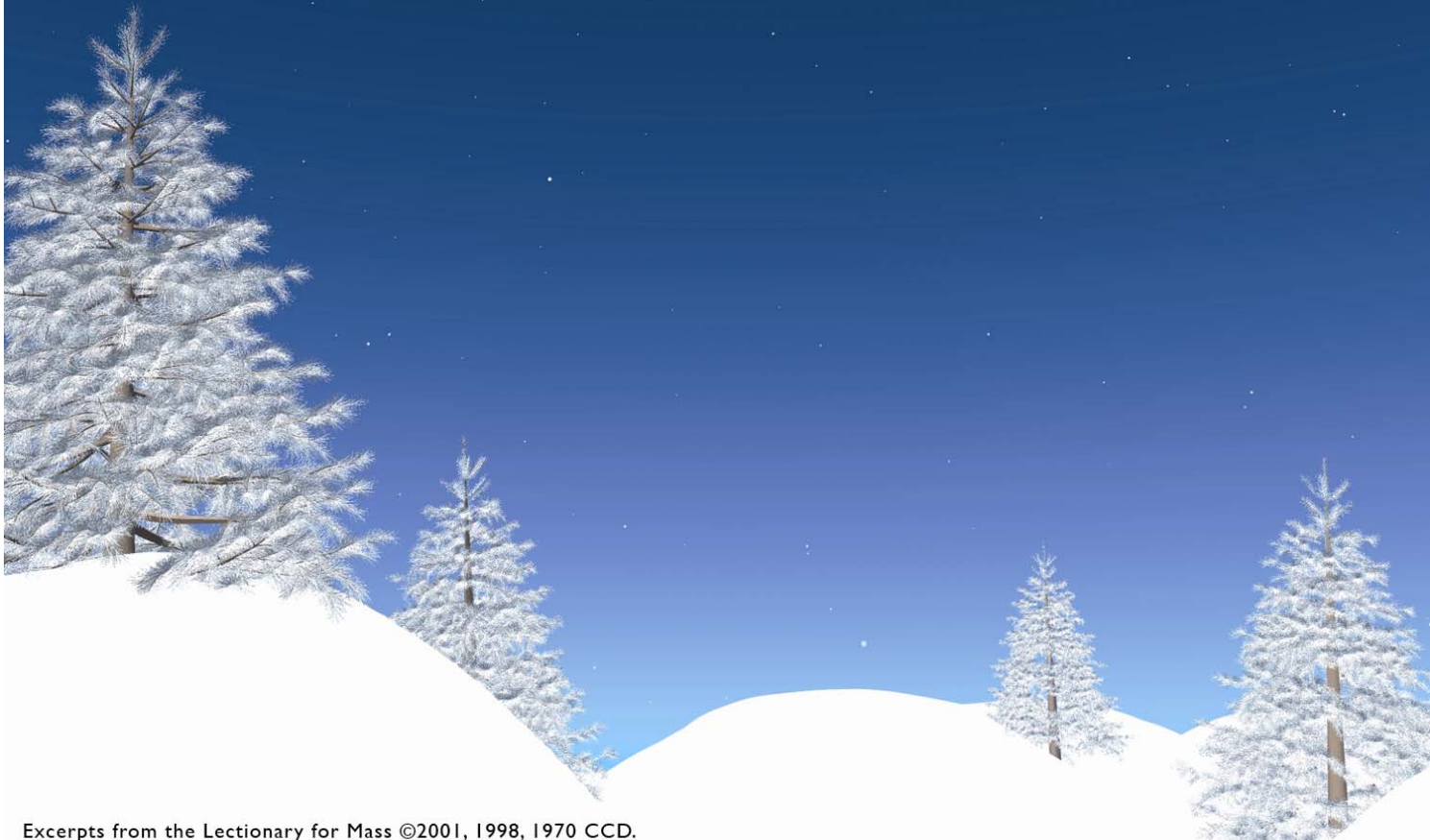

From Mary’s Desk:

Turning the Calendar Page on the New Year:

The dark rhetoric outlining the horror of the past 10 years of this new millennium is peppered all over the news stands. Photojournalists capture the highlights once again of 911, the wars of the decade, the natural disasters which include tsunamis and hurricanes, fires and floods. The photos pull the American psyche toward descent rather than shaping a horizon of hope. In these long cold days of January, perhaps it is time to hunker down with some reading material which might just shape our minds in a way that we can journey on to higher ground. Yes, it is good to know the dark side of history, however, as the People of God, born in Christ through the sacraments of life and inspired by the Holy Spirit to travel the roads of life with Christ, I would like to suggest some good books with themes of hope and which take the spirit on a more contemplative path.

1. **Scarred by Struggle, Transformed by Hope**, Sr. Joan D. Chittister. Sr. Joan in her prophetic outlook develops the Genesis tussle between God and Jacob. She identifies struggle as a necessary challenge to growth. Her pages are filled with examples of life challenges that grow the human soul, yet her comments on courage and hope move the reader away from fear and dread to the realization that all change is necessary as we live our lives oriented toward a God who invites transformation. A must read!

2. **The Naked Now**, Richard Rohr, Franciscan priest and founder of the Center for Action and Contemplation. In this world of dual thinking, where we have moved away from civil discourse...liberals on one side of the fence and conservatives on the other, Rohr offers brilliant insights as to how the mind and soul today must transcend dualistic thinking so that we can live as a hopeful nation. He offers suggestions and tools to move beyond opinionated blocks and teaches the heart to enter contemplation, where the soul in union with God, experiences a healthy melt-down of the false self, in order to enter the vision of God. Life-changing book!

3. **Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening**, Cyntha Bourgeault, 2004. Cyntha’s book on prayer and contemplation has become the golden ring of the books on contemplative prayer. She examines the practice of centering prayer from the Christian tradition and offers methods of prayer which have the potential to transform Christian life. A little more technical, perhaps, one might want to take it slower but in the end, one understands the tried and true methods of surrender to the Divine plan.

4. **Prayerfulness: Awakening to the Fullness of Life**, Robert Wicks, 2009. His other must read is **Crossing the Desert**. Both books will inspire heartfelt resolutions for the serious seeker. He points toward living a life of compassion and love. You might also be aware that St. Mary has quite an extensive library upstairs in the hallway (next to Room 312). It is well stocked with great books, spiritual classics, biographies of great saints and leaders, spiritual reading and other theology for the hungry mind. Take advantage of it. All you need to do is sign out the book of choice and return it when you are finished.

Radiant at What You See

Epiphany gets its name right here, in the story of the three astrologers from the East. They saw a sign in the heavens, correctly understood it and chose to follow it, no matter the personal cost. These three are fearless pilgrims, walking in the tiny light of a star, traveling by faith. They are called wise because they search the heavens and their dreams for direction from a source they cannot name. And in their zeal, they find the One they are looking for.

The astrologers were the first Gentile followers of Jesus. Without the benefit of Scripture or the stories of salvation, without religion and its rituals, they made their way into the presence of Christ. Many have since followed in their winding footsteps, through many places and years, searching for the light that they do not entirely understand but are willing to risk everything for. Mainstream religion tends to scorn them, banish them to the New Age, ridicule their search. But some of them will find their way to the light, with or without our encouragement. Employment Ministry

Lumen Christi Group Leader, Tim Pappas shares with us this inspiring reflection on 2009 and his commitment to employment for 2010.

The glass is normally half full for me. I try to see the good things out of any situation and even in the worst times if I get a moment of quiet reflection, I am often able to see the good that comes out of something unfortunate or unexpected. The other day, however, I overheard the strangest conversation imaginable. I was walking through the skywalk downtown following a couple of businessmen who were talking about who was in worse shape and who had less to be thankful for in 2009. As they seemed to try "upping" one another for their lack of blessings this year, it caused me to reflect: Where was my blessing in this past year? Were my circumstances worse than the two businessmen complaining about how they had been "served" in 2009? I wondered: Is misery ladled out in tepid bowlfuls that must be consumed to the last drop?

As Marilyn, my benevolent and patient (some say long-suffering) bride of 22 plus years and I sat quietly discussing the events of the day one cold early December evening (a regular custom for us), we eventually came to a review of the year 2009. Some of our friends know what we have been through and have called our bowl of misery "difficult," "unfortunate," or "unbelievable." Yet if one were the proverbial "fly on the wall," one might have mistaken our conversation for a couple that had won a modest lottery. We took the year to get refocused, examine our priorities and sharpen our activities in service to those less fortunate than us and there are plenty less fortunate than us. Although we did not have much money to give, we had time and talent to lend.

In response to the Christmas letter of 2008, I started an unemployment networking group early this year. I will continue to be involved with the group until there are no more unemployed or underemployed and by Christ's calculations, it will not be in my lifetime. The group is a collaboration of three churches on the Southwest side and weekly about 30 to 40 unemployed come together to strengthen one another by sharing their faith, ideas, information and practical expertise. As of this writing, 37 people in the group have found jobs since March. A good start, but admittedly for every person who finds employment, there is usually two to three new people showing up. Despite what you might read, this crisis is not over, not by a long shot. It might be easy to get depressed, too, because there are some really good, generous and talented people in the group that are in awful situations. Some are threatened with losing homes, others have used food pantries or co-ops for the first time in their lives and still others have been forced to move back in or depend on aging parents for financial support. Many have been humbled, still others feel so humiliated that it is difficult for them to get out of bed and get dressed only to be fed another lukewarm bowl of rancid uncertainty. What the last year has taught me, in a very tangible way, is that we are never far from being in the same situation as the people we serve. We are never far from helping someone out of it either no matter what resources (or lack of them) are available. That is the message this year. Do not give up hope. Is there anything impossible or too hard for the Lord?

Thank you God for carrying this flawed body through this broken and chaotic world, for without the challenges I would not appreciate what I have. Thank you, God for allowing me to discover in my brothers and sisters the quiet calm of Your spirit in the hearts of people prepared to seek Your face in a world determined to hide it.

As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.
