# DISCIPLESHIP (FORMERLY CATHOLIC FORMATION)

Your Catholic Formation Department offered a multitude of ways for parishioners of all ages to gather together as Disciples of Jesus Christ, to grow deeper in our relationship with him in our community, and to introduce others to Jesus Christ. In October Fr. Don Calloway presented discipleship viewed from the eyes of Mary. Over 150 parishioners joined in a parish-wide book study on From Christendom to Apostolic Mission, with many individuals learning about the world outside of the Church, where we are called to share the Gospel. Our praise and worship team was joined by Fr. Aaron for our Be Still and Know evenings. Praying the Stations of the Cross and celebrating May Crowning and Corpus



Christi Sunday provided powerful experiences. Countless participants joined us for Bishop Robert Barron's *The Sacraments*, hosted by Fr. Aaron. Seasons 2 and 3 of *The Chosen* were popular Wednesday night offerings, and for the first time ever we conducted two rounds of Reach More Training Groups where we help individuals discover their desire to lead others to Jesus Christ. Our RCIA offerings helped numerous adults to become fully initiated into the Catholic Church. Finally, this Lent we featured thirteen small groups for a Lenten Study.

Elementary, middle and high school youth had numerous opportunities to grow as disciples here at St. Mary as well. Middle school youth attended regular formation sessions on Sundays and Mondays, while high school students chose from a variety of courses including: Connected which explored Catholic Social Teaching; The Invitation which explored the habits of discipleship; and Venture which examined Salvation History from the book of Genesis to Revelation and its impact on our lives today. In addition, thirty-seven high school students preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation were treated to a day-long retreat from the Menasha, Wisconsin-based Spiritus Ministries. Advent saw a group of middle school youth exploring saints and scripture, while a number of middle schoolers attended the Wisconsin Catholic Youth Rally in March 2023. Several students also spent part of their summer serving at the Xaverian Missionaries house setting up for their annual festival.

### **HUMAN CONCERNS**

Through God's grace and Fr. Aaron's strong support, our commission transitioned to a volunteer-led group. All our past endeavors, along with some new activities, have returned as fully *in-person* service opportunities.

In Fall we were blessed with a visit from the new (two years) pastor from Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Latiboliere, Haiti. The pandemic and civil strife in the country had twice-postponed celebrating our twenty-year anniversary of our twinning relationship. Fr. Bellegarde brought good news that the clinic destroyed by last year's earthquake has been rebuilt. Our Haitian brothers and sisters continue to keep us in their prayers. The Respect Life ministry called upon us to uphold the dignity of *all* life, and to help with the increasing needs of the Women's Support Center of Milwaukee. Circle of Love brought back the beautiful tradition of inviting parishioners to pick gift-request envelopes from Christmas trees. None of the tags (representing over 400 gifts) were left on the trees after that first selection weekend; parishioners made the holidays brighter for *everyone*. St. Vincent de Paul was so overwhelmed by your donations for the annual Thanksgiving food drive that they were able to abundantly supply *four* other struggling parish pantries.



The newly-formed Racial Justice ministry, through its "On the Road to Damascus" series, coordinated presentations, book discussions, and small-group discernment sessions designed to reflect upon and educate towards racial healing. (Next year the ministry will have been absorbed under the Discipleship Commission.) Repairers of the Breach greatly expanded their winter emergency shelter hours and have rebounded to near pre-pandemic levels in terms of visits/services. A coat drive, a winter essentials collection, a soup collection, weekly bread distributions, lunch-making, dinner preparing - all variously supported Nia Imani Family, Inc., Pathfinders, Repairers of the Breach, St. Ben's, and SVdP's Southside meal program. The parish's Lenten almsgiving raised over \$17,500, plus requested items for featured ministry partners.

All our partners appreciate the steadfast support our parish provides. One of the challenges will be to reengage the personal interactions with our brother and sisters. We invite you to join us in building God's kingdom here on earth!



#### LITURGY

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is where everything begins. Every aspect of our parish finds it's meaning in the Mass. Why? Because, as the Second Vatican Council states, the Eucharist is the "source and summit of all Christian life" (SC, 47). What a joy it is to pray together as a vibrant worshipping community every weekend. While our Liturgy Team has been experiencing transition for the past year, with the help of many hands, both staff and volunteer, God has given us the grace to pray and worship well. How exciting that we have welcomed Mr. Jim Clauer as our Director of Liturgy and Music. We cannot wait to see what the Holy Spirit has in store for us!

We can see the Holy Spirit alive in our liturgy not only when celebrating Mass but in our many other prayer opportunities like Be Still and Know, May Crowning, Corpus Christi Procession, Divine Mercy Holy Hour and many more. The devotional part of prayer shines through as many people come to spend time with Jesus in Eucharistic Adoration.

How blessed we are to have a faith community that is on fire with the Holy Spirit. As we celebrate this past year we do so knowing that it is all because of God and for His glory.

# ANNUAL REPORT - JUNE 30, 2023

We are pleased to report we achieved our fourth year in a row of balanced budgets. Thus, we are reporting a slight operating surplus of \$38,644 (approximately 1% revenue) for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023. Similarly, the Finance Council has approved and submitted another break-even budget for the fiscal year of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. With your support, we hope to achieve that target in the months ahead. While balanced budgets and careful stewardship of your generous support are relevant to the annual report, our primary focus remains bringing people closer to the Lord through Word, Sacrament and Service. We acknowledge with deep gratitude all the sacrifices you make to allow us to do this on a daily basis through our Liturgy, School, and Discipleship efforts.

Operating revenue was within \$7,088 of budget, with tuition increases and automation of our tuition collection processes largely offsetting declines in monthly contributions. We are carefully monitoring monthly contributions as this is our largest source of income and has fluctuated in the past year. As previously reported, contributions have been impacted by external forces like inflation and a down stock market. Contributions have also been impacted by internal forces like fewer parishioner registrations and our recent capital campaign. The Finance Council also declined to take the annually budgeted draw from the Endowment fund to avoid selling assets in a down market. As a result we came very close to the targeted income. We will remain watchful as similar revenue challenges face us in the coming year.

On the expense side we were able to achieve our targets through careful parish spending and the temporary reprieve in salary costs which came from unfilled positions of Parish Accountant and Director of Liturgy and Music for most of the fiscal year. We are running a lean Parish Staff and as a consequence we have had to call on volunteers and parishioners during these challenging times. We have been blessed to have filled our open positions, so we do not anticipate similar savings in the 2024 fiscal year. Any time we can be within one percent of our expense targets is cause for gratitude and we came in at \$36,000 under the budgeted expense overall.

Notes: These statements are inclusive of the operating income and expense which is budgeted to break even. Significant non-operating events (monies raised for specific one-time projects, capital campaigns, and support to others) are reported here by footnote to avoid skewing our operating results. The largest non-operating event in fiscal 2023 was the successful Love One Another Capital Campaign to raise pledges of \$2.7 million dollars of which \$1.6 million will come to support St. Mary. It's important to distinguish between pledges (a promise to support the campaign) and collections (money actually donated) as the \$1.6 million of pledges to St. Mary will be collected over a five-year period. Our share of the Love One Another collections in fiscal 2023 (January through June) were \$332,000. It is also important to note that the replacement of the upper parking lot occurred after the fiscal year end of June 30, 2023 at a cost of \$515,000 and that project came in better than budget. We also replaced our failing phone system at an anticipated cost of \$40,000. As such, these first two Love One Another Campaign projects consumed more than has been collected to date. This timing will slow our ability to do more projects under the Love One Another Campaign until collections catch up to the project expenditures. Our community also provided \$96,000 of support to our sister parish in Haiti and we collected \$114,000 in our Building Repair Fund. The Building Repair Fund will keep our facilities going until the Love One Another collections catch up to the project costs and new projects can begin. Priority to all capital projects is given to those that reduce our operating cost or significantly improve the quality of worship and education.
