CATHOLIC FORMATION | "My teaching is not mine, but His who sent me." John 7:16

We are known by many names: Catholic Formation, religious education, lifelong faith formation, CCD, and church school. These titles often evoke the image of children being taught the Catholic faith, and while we certainly do assist parents in the faith development of their children, that is merely one aspect of our mission. At the core we are an extension of our pastor's duty to teach - to journey with those seeking a more intimate relationship with Jesus Christ.

This past year witnessed a plethora of opportunities for disciples to deepen that relationship through: preparation for the Sacraments of Baptism, First Holy Communion, First Reconciliation, Youth Confirmation,



and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). We continue to partner with parents in the formation of children in preschool, elementary, and middle school. Our ministry to high school youth helps them navigate the life of a disciple in today's world while assisting those who have chosen to prepare to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Adults said yes to the invitation to follow Jesus by attending offerings like *Bible Basics*, *The Chosen*, *Bishop Barron's*: The Mass, Jesus: The Way, The Truth and The Life, No Greater Love, and more. Individuals with a desire to share the love of Jesus Christ found spiritual formation and practical training through our *Reach More Missionary Discipleship Training Groups*. Our team continues to offer weekly Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, seasonal *Be Still and Know* evenings and the *Arise* Praise and Worship evening held this past May. The social media outlet *Flocknote* helps us share the Catholic faith with over one thousand individuals beyond our physical campus through regular messaging. This past year we happily assisted Fr. Aaron with Lenten Stations of the Cross, parish Holy Hours and the recent Corpus Christi procession.

It certainly has been a busy year. We look forward to walking alongside you as disciples of Jesus Christ in the coming year.

SOCIAL CONCERNS | A Year of Challenges, Hope, and Transitions

The past parish calendar year began with the devastating earthquake destroying 80% of the infrastructure in Latiboliere, Haiti, home of our sister parish, Notre Dame du Perpetuel Secours. Our parishioners generously donated to help in the recovery efforts. Grateful beyond measure, the people received food and needed supplies immediately (in collaboration with Food for the Poor). We, along with other parishes in the Archdiocese and private donors, raised over \$140,000. Food, medical aid and support toward rebuilding initiatives helped to stabilize our village. A temporary roof was raised over the church, children ate school lunches, clean-up efforts rapidly proceeded, and progress has been made on a new clinic. Resources continue to support the quality of life in the village. Although St. Mary isn't 100% responsible financially for all of these initiatives, without our support and long-standing relationship, things would be much worse. All the people in Latiboliere and those of us who work closely on the Haiti partnership send our thanks and prayers. The future is hopeful because of you.

On the home front, St. Mary continued to generously support our ministry partner organizations. At the beginning of the year we were



unable to do much "in-person" as we were still dealing with COVID-19. Our Circle of Love, SVdP pantry and meal programs were supported, but carried out in a socially distanced manner. After January though, we were able to begin in-person service. Our 8th graders prepared and served four meals to Repairers of the Breach, our United Heart Scripture Group began to meet and St. Ben's opened for sit-down meals. Throughout the pandemic, you stayed faithful to supporting our outreach initiatives. During Lent we were able to celebrate by hosting our partners and bringing donations back to church. All of our partners comment on the faithfulness of our parish in supporting them, and thanks for your extravagant tenderness and generosity - you provide HOPE!

Our Human Concerns team transitioned from a staff-led commission to an all-volunteer ministry with Fr. Aaron's support. Change is often difficult, but many of your fellow parishioners have stepped up to build and grow our tradition of love, prayer, and accompaniment for those who God places in our path to help. Rewarding work, we invite you to live out your call to discipleship by getting involved. God Bless and Thanks!

We are pleased to report a temporary operating surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022 of \$114,862 which is 2.9% better than the break-even budget approved by our Finance Council for 2022.

Operating revenue was \$61,643 (1.6%) less than budgeted due in large part to our monthly envelopes. Monthly envelopes, our largest source of revenue, was \$100,224 behind budget and \$111,457 less than last year. The return to Mass post-COVID-19 allowed our offertory collections to rebound to \$105,208, (still below the \$127,460 average in the years prior to COVID-19), but better than last year. School revenue was stronger as we increased from 355 to 365 students during the year and increased tuition collections and fundraising, exceeding budget by \$70,435.

On the expense side the Liturgy and Music departments again have temporarily unfilled positions. Open positions create a significant salary savings, but these are unsustainable. We've been blessed to have volunteers and help-out musicians who have filled the voids. Our Formation department has responded to fewer enrolled students post-COVID-19 by introducing numerous adult programs designed to deepen faith and grow our community. The school expenses were 1.5% better than budget, due to salary and health insurance savings associated with the retirement of some of our teachers. Maintenance expenses were controlled and a mild winter lead to some savings in the care of our buildings and grounds.

We submitted another break-even budget for the fiscal year July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023. The assumptions built in next year's budget are a return to more normal levels of staffing in our Formation, Liturgy, and School programs. We look forward to people returning to Mass and we celebrate the successful kick-off of our School and Formation activities this fall.

Notes: These statements are inclusive of the operating income of the Parish. Non-operating activities include a previously noted COVID-19 related Small Business Administration (SBA) loan, under their Paycheck Protection Program, in the amount of \$466,000, which was forgiven by the SBA in fiscal 2022 and \$84,941 raised and distributed by the Haiti program. School families raised \$85,000 for playground resurfacing with project specific donations. Funds raised for specific capital projects are non-operating income. We spent \$80,351 through our building repair fund on new carpeting, painting, stairwells, LED light replacements in the Gathering Space and Gym. We will continue to prioritize non-operating expenditures around capital improvements items we believe will reduce our operating cost or significantly improve the quality of worship and education as we grow our community.
